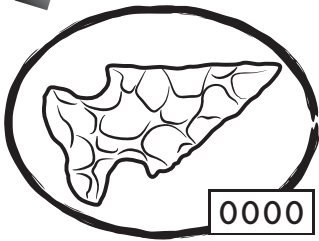

## **CLUES for your hike!**

1. Park at the Rail Trail (Vicksburg) parking area.
2. Turn right on the trail and walk toward the History of the Rail Trail sign.
3. Stay straight on the gravel trail. You will pass a green 4.5-mile marker.
4. When you reach the intersection with Young Road, turn around and walk back the way you came.
5. On your way back, look to the left near the pavilion with picnic tables to find the post. Your vehicle should be nearby.

## **Did You Know?**

An arrowhead is the sharp, pointed tip of an arrow, but not all pointy stones are arrowheads.

## CLUES for your hike!

1. Park in the gravel parking area near the road.
2. Stand facing the information sign. Walk toward Buffalo Creek, following the blue paint marks on the trees (called blazes).
3. When you see a wooden post with a “6” on it, turn left and go up the steps and switchbacks.
4. After the switchbacks, turn right and continue to follow the blue blazes. Stay straight at any intersections.
5. Walk under the powerlines and enjoy the view of the farm fields.
6. Keep going until you reach a sharp left turn in the trail. Look for a wooden post with the number “10” on it. The post is nearby.
7. After you find the post, stay on the trail and hike under the powerlines again.
8. When you reach the wide-open field, turn left, and stay near the blue posts. This is a great place to watch for birds.
9. At the next intersection, walk straight across the dirt road and continue to follow the blue blazes.
10. Stay straight on the trail as you head toward the Dale Engle Walker House and Milne Log Cabin, both built in the 1700s.
11. Follow the dirt and gravel road back to the parking area where you started.

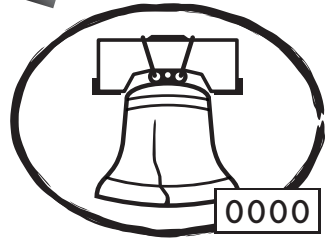

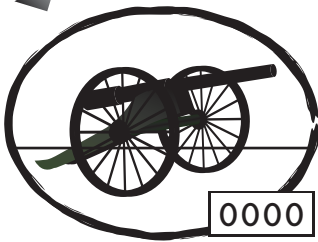

## CLUES for your hike!

1. Cross the silver bridge to enter the park. You'll see a big pond in front of you.
2. Turn right and follow the gravel path that goes around the park.
3. When you get to the intersection near the pavilion, stay to the right so the picnic tables are on your left.
4. Cross the small metal bridge and keep right.
5. The path will loop around the park and go through some trees. Soon you'll spot another bridge up ahead, but don't cross it. Just keep following the path as it curves back toward the small metal bridge you already crossed.
6. Turn right to cross the bridge again and walk toward the playgrounds. Look for the post nearby.
7. After you find the post, keep walking past the playgrounds and follow the path all the way back to the silver bridge and the park entrance.

## CLUES for your hike!

1. Start your adventure on the sidewalk along St. Louis Street, facing the red brick path and tall brick pillars.
2. Walk through the brick pillars on your left. Stay to the left and follow the sidewalk downhill into Hufnagle Park, heading toward the outdoor stage (also called an amphitheater).
3. Keep following the sidewalk and walk slightly uphill through the opening in the stone wall.
4. Stay to the left and follow the sidewalk over the bridge that crosses Bull Run stream.
5. After the bridge, turn left onto the sidewalk at 6th Street.
6. When you reach St. Louis Street, use the crosswalk to carefully cross the street.
7. Turn left and walk toward the playground, crossing Bull Run stream again.
8. Walk past the playground on your right.
9. Turn right when you see the green and white sign that says: "Boro of Lewisburg Kidsburg Stream Restoration and Nature Playground."
10. The railroad tracks will be on your left, and the playground will now be on your right.
11. Turn left at the intersection and walk toward the Kidsburg Nature Playground. Look to your right - you'll find the post nearby.
12. Walk back through the playground and return to the red brick pillars where you started.

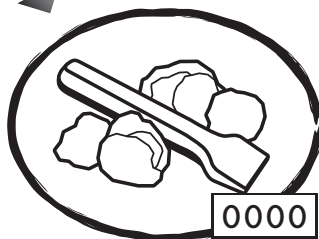

## CLUES for your hike!

1. Park near the playground and tennis courts.
2. Follow the sidewalk toward the pool, keeping the playground on your right.
3. Stay to the left and follow the sidewalk as it curves around the outer edge of the park. You'll see a basketball court on your left.
4. When the path splits, stay to the left, and cross over the bridge. After the bridge, follow the path as it curves right toward the climbing boulders.
5. At the T in the sidewalk, turn right toward the skatepark. Look for a crosswalk on your left and use it to cross 15th Street.
6. Walk along the trail with the stream on your left and soccer fields on your right.
7. If you look closely at the trees on your right, you will find the post.
8. Keep following the dirt trail around the soccer fields until it turns into a sidewalk. Cross the crosswalk and return to the starting point to complete the loop.

## CLUES for your hike!

1. Your adventure begins at the Union County World War II Honor Roll.
2. Walk in the direction of the blue playground, keeping the pool on your left and the playground on your right.
3. When you reach the bathroom building, turn left onto the paved path.
4. The pool will stay on your left, and a second playground will be on your right.
5. When you reach Fifth Street, turn right and walk toward the Buffalo Valley Rail Trail.
6. Turn right again to enter the rail trail.
7. After the fence ends you will pass a yellow post, then turn right.
8. Walk across the grass toward the pavilions with picnic tables.
9. Look at Pavilion Number Two on your left; the post is near the far end.
10. Walk carefully beside the blue playground and through the parking area to return to your vehicle.

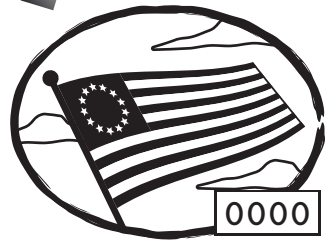

## CLUES for your hike!

1. Start by walking on the gravel trail toward the playground equipment.
2. When you see the brown and yellow sign pointing toward the South Trail, turn right.
3. Walk under the bridge and into the woods, staying on the trail alongside the Susquehanna River.
4. Stay to the left along the outer edge of the park, keeping the river on your left.
5. As you reach the tip of the South Island, look among the trees - the post will be nearby.
6. Keep the river on your left as you continue. You will walk back under the bridge and follow the signs for the North Trail.
7. Follow the North Trail as it curves around the tip of the North Island.
8. When you see the gravel path and the playground ahead, keep going and follow the gravel path back to your vehicle.

## CLUES for your hike!

1. Park in the wide parking area directly off Route 192 facing Halfway Lake.
2. Go down the steps and start on the Lakeside Trail, turning left and following the path around the lake.
3. Turn right to cross over the stream and bridge.
4. At the sign for Rapid Run Nature Trail, turn left and head into the wooded area.
5. At the first intersection, go straight and follow the sign to the Overlook Trail.
6. At the next intersection, stay straight and slightly to the right, continuing to follow the arrows toward the Overlook Trail.
7. Carefully cross the road; when you re-enter on the Overlook Trail, you will start going uphill on switchbacks.
8. Follow the yellow blazes on the trees as you make your way uphill.
9. At the top of the overlook, find the post and enjoy the view.
10. Return the same way you came, heading down the switchbacks on the Overlook Trail.
11. When you exit the trail and see the lake and beach, turn right to cross over the bridge and then left as you follow the Lakeside Trail back to your vehicle.

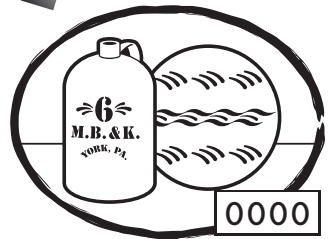

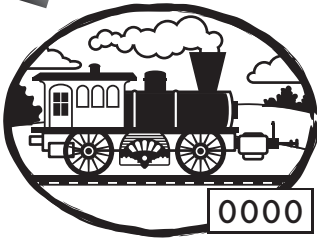

## CLUES for your hike!

1. Park along the trees near the Sand Bridge State Park sign.
2. Walk toward the bridge and cross over the stream. Once across, follow the gravel path uphill.
3. Walk past the trees with white dots on them, continuing uphill.
4. When you reach Copper Mill Road, turn around and head back downhill, following the same path you came up.
5. As you walk downhill, stay to the right.
6. Turn left when you reach the first brown pavilion. You will find the post near the trees on your right side.
7. Reverse your steps: walk back past the pavilion, cross the bridge again, and return to your vehicle.

## CLUES for your hike!

1. As you enter Shikellamy State Park, park in the last parking area to your left across from the old marina building. Look toward the river. You should see a sign that says, "Susquehanna River Watershed." Your hike begins here.
2. When you reach the sign, turn left and follow the paved path that is closest to the inside edge.
3. Walk past the old marina building.
4. When the paths split, stay to the left and walk slightly uphill toward the playground and the brown Hill restroom.
5. Follow the path as it curves to the right. Walk downhill and cross over the crosswalk toward the river.
6. At the bottom of the path, turn right, walking away from the boat launch area.
7. You will pass the rowing pavilion on your left.
8. As you get closer to where the West and North Branch rivers meet, look among the trees on the right to find the post.
9. When you reach Kury Point, follow the path on the left toward your vehicle.
10. When you reach the Point restroom, stay on the path to your right until you safely return to the "Susquehanna River Watershed" sign.

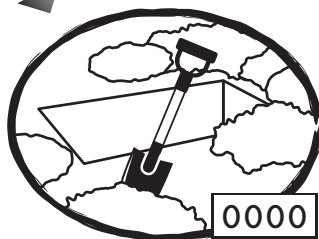

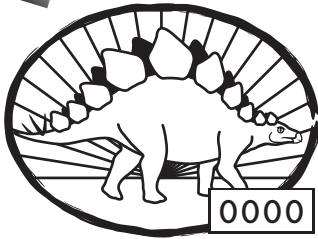

## CLUES for your hike!

1. Park in the upper parking area near the playground.
2. Face the fence overlooking the North and West Branches of the Susquehanna River.
3. Turn right and walk downhill. Keep the river and fence on your left.
4. When you see a brown and yellow sign that says "Trail," turn right and cross the road.
5. Follow the yellow trail markers (blazes). Go down the wooden steps, cross the bridge, then go up the wooden steps.
6. At the top, stay to the left and follow the trail along the edge of the park.
7. When the trail splits, you will see a sign for "Dry Hollow Trail" and "Deer Trail." Turn left onto Deer Trail. Go down the stairs and cross the bridge.
8. After you hike uphill, look to your left for a tree with the post on it.
9. Follow the yellow blazes uphill until you reach the fence. Turn right to return to your vehicle.

## CLUES for your hike!

1. Start by walking into the park on the gravel path.
2. Stay on the left side as you head toward the big playground.
3. Follow the path as it curves. Keep the beige fence on your left and the playground on your right.
4. When the path splits, stick to the left and walk between the trees.
5. As the path loops around, keep your eyes open. The post is hiding somewhere on your right!
6. When you reach the dog-waste station, turn right.
7. At the pavement games, turn left onto the paved path.
8. When you meet the gravel path again, turn left and follow it back toward your vehicle.

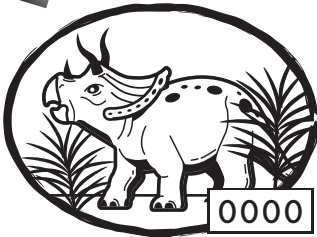

## CLUES for your hike!

1. Park in the gravel parking area and look for the trail opening on the left side. Enter the Demonstration Forest.
2. Follow the trail over rocks and roots, watching for blue blazes on the trees.
3. When you reach the educational sign on the right, that says "Low Down on High Grading," start looking for the post. It will be on your left. .
4. Cross over the grass and gravel road, staying straight on the trail and avoiding the fence on the left.
5. Follow the path as it loops around and brings you back to where you started.
